## 36 colleges participate in summit at Ohio EMA

### College and university emergency managers seek common bonds

COLUMBUS -- Nearly 70 college and university emergency management professionals from around Ohio gathered at the first-ever Ohio Campus Emergency Management Summit at the Ohio Emergency Management Agency April 5.

"You are responsible for protecting some of

Ohio's most valuable assets," said John Born, director of the Ohio Department of Public Safety, in his welcome to the group.

In the day-long summit, campus emergency managers heard from their counterparts from other colleges on a wide variety of topics including drones; "Game Day" preparation; pre-event planning; active shooter scenario; and "Partners in Preparedness," focusing on campus and county emergency managers working together. The college and university emergency managers also toured the State of Ohio Emergency Operations Center.

"We're excited to bring a large group of campus and university emergency managers together for the first time," said Sima Merick, executive director of the Ohio Emergency Management Agency. "This excellent networking opportunity will lead to better collaboration among campus emergency managers and help bring local emergency managers and their college and university partners together." Thirty-six of Ohio's colleges and universities were represented at the summit, which was sponsored by the Ohio Emergency Management Agency and the Ohio Department of Higher Education.

## FEMA releases new Damage Assessment Operations Manual

On April 5, 2016, FEMA released their new Damage Assessment Operations Manual. The manual combines the roles and responsibilities and damage assessment requirements for both Individual Assistance (IA) (homes and businesses) and Public Assistance (PA) (government and eligible private non-profit organizations). Summarized below are significant changes from past criteria and/or processes. The

### Individual Assistance (IA)

There is one significant change to the "Major" category for a conventionally built home in a flood event. The revised criteria is: Waterline above 18 inches in an essential living space, a waterline above the electrical

outlets, or a **waterline on the first floor of a residence when the basement is completely full**. Also note, references to habitability and length of time to repair a structure have been removed. FEMA also no longer uses "primary" living space, rather refers to "essential" living space. Essential living space is defined as: occupied bedrooms,

### **G291 Joint Information Center / Joint Information System (JIC/JIS) Planning Course, May 12, 2016, Cincinnati - Hamilton County Regional Operations Center, 2000 Radcliff Drive, Cincinnati, Ohio 45204**

**Course Description:** This course builds on individual Public Information Officer (PIO) competencies by applying those skills in an expanding incident where coordination is enhanced through activation of a Joint Information System (JIS) and establishment of a Joint Information Center (JIC). This training will equip PIOs with the skills needed to establish and operate in a JIS/JIC. Participants will also gain a working knowledge of operational practices for performing PIO duties within the National Incident Management System (NIMS) Multi-Agency Coordination System. The course will demonstrate how JIC concepts are applied in a flexible and scalable manner at the local level.

### **G393 Mitigation for Emergency Managers, September 26 - 27, 2016, Ohio Emergency Management Agency, 2855 West Dublin Granville Road, Columbus, OH 43235**

**Course Description:** This free course is designed to enable the non-technical emergency worker to acquire skills in the use of mitigation. The course provides training in how to perform mitigation activities fundamental to reducing and eliminating long-term risk from hazards. It addresses the important roles of the Emergency Program Manager (or other local government representative) in mitigation: motivator, coordinator, and monitor in local implementation of the National Mitigation Strategy. ### **L969 Communications Unit Leader (COML)**

**May 3 - 6, 2016, Medina Co EMA, 555 Independence Drive, Medina, OH 44256**

**Course Description:** This free four-day course helps attendees establish the essential core competencies required for performing the duties of the COMM UL in an all-hazards incident. This course

addresses all responsibilities appropriate to a COMM UL operating in a local- or state-level AHIMT. These responsibilities include the collection, processing and dissemination as needed to facilitate operations of command, general staff, and unit leaders within the confines of a Type 3 AH Incident Management Team. The course is an instructor-led training that supports learning through discussion, lecture, and active participation in multiple exercises. By requiring attendees to bring Communications Unit Leader Kit to the instruction, the course provides a realistic, hands-on approach to mastering the skills of a COMM UL.

### **AWR-308 Natural Disaster Awareness for Senior Caregivers Course (NDPTC Course)**

**May 27, 2016, Cincinnati-Hamilton County Regional Operations Center, 2000 Radcliff Drive, Cincinnati, OH 45204**

**Course Description:** This four-hour course is designed to enhance the caregiver's awareness of vulnerability factors associated with natural hazards. Senior citizens are particularly vulnerable to natural hazards. Factors such as physical limitations, mental ailments, and medication requirements are issues of concern for caregivers of senior citizens. These specific needs, amongst other considerations for natural hazards, must be addressed in preparedness plans for these at-risk citizens. Participants will learn how to identify, prepare, and perform a number of support activities that will ensure the safety and security of senior citizens when a natural hazard event occurs. ### **L958 NIMS ICS All-Hazards Operations Section Chief June 14 - 17, 2016, Ohio Emergency Management Agency, 2855 West Dublin Granville Road, Columbus, OH 43235**

**Course Description:** This free four-day course is designed to provide local and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective OSC on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team. These responsibilities fall into two categories: 1) responding to the incident and the command needs of the incident, and 2) effectively fulfilling the position responsibilities of an Operations Section Chief on an All-Hazards ICS Incident Management Team. Exercises, simulations, discussions, and a final exam enable students to process and apply their new knowledge.

### **MGT-323 Instructor Development Workshop**

**August 9 - 11, 2016, Ohio Emergency Management Agency, 2855 West Dublin Granville Road, Columbus, OH 43235**

**Course Description:** This free three-day course primarily serves to give instructors, most of whom already have years of instructional

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experience within their own organizations, insight into adult education principles as well as the opportunity to comment on and improve their instructional style. The course focuses on enhancing instructional skills that may be applied within DHS-certified courses, but it also discusses organization-specific policies, procedures and practices. The goal of this course is to ensure instructional excellence by providing a forum for experienced instructors to share their experiences with participants and learn together, both during discussions of instructional techniques and in commenting on each other's presentation skills during prepared teach-backs.

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bathrooms, kitchen, dinette, and living room. Recreational and other common areas (i.e. laundry) in a basement are non-essential living space, and assessments and damage should be evaluated as though the basement is unfinished. Finally, FEMA is requesting the damage assessment team take one photograph of each structure evaluated as major and destroyed. The photograph should easily depict the reason the structure was assessed as major or destroyed. It is recommended that the photo be taken close up as opposed to landscapes from the street. For flood events, waterlines should be easily visible in the photo.

### Public Assistance (PA)

The changes to damage assessment for PA center around the detail and documentation required to support estimated costs. When assessing damage to infrastructure, the applicants will need to support estimated costs with damage dimensions, material

### Damage Assessment Tools

**WebEOC:** The Disaster Recovery Branch (DRB) continues to work with WebEOC staff at Ohio EMA to enhance the damage assessment boards. Once finished, there will be separate boards for Individual Assistance (IA) and Public Assistance (PA) and the ability to upload attachments such as "street sheets" and the PA Damage Assessment form and photos. We need to incorporate FEMA's changes outlined below and then the boards will be available for use. Anticipate completion by late spring.

**Damage Assessment Applications:** DRB is currently working with the State of Indiana and Ohio EMA's WebEOC and GIS staff to make available a damage assessment app

developed by Indiana for conducting IA damage assessment. The app can be used with any Apple, Android or Windows system. The app allows for damage assessment to be conducted even without connectivity. Availability for this app won't likely occur until the fall but it is on the horizon!

**Assistance Toolbox:** The Assistance Toolbox will be updated by late spring to account for FEMA's changes.

**Training:** DRB staff is also updating training materials and will be ready for a busy year bringing training to a county like yours. Once training materials are updated, please coordinate scheduling training through Ohio EMA's Training Section.

quantities and size or capacity of facility elements. Estimates should include calculations. Locations should be documented using street addresses or GPS and should be mapped. Large projects (currently anything estimated at \$121,800 and over) will require additional documentation such as copies of contract estimates,

bids, etc. FEMA will also more thoroughly access insurance coverage, therefore, if insurable facilities are damaged, applicants should bring copies of their insurance policies. Finally, a more thorough review of the eligibility of private non-profit organizations will be conducted during the damage assessment process.
